














#### Letter from the Executive Director

Dear HATW friends and supporters,

Reflecting on 2023, the words resilience and adaptability come to mind. When friends and family ask how work is going, I usually measure things with a roller coaster metaphor. I know, given my contacts with other non-profit leaders, that the wild ride is not a unique experience. Knowing that the roller coaster always climbs back up the track after a dip is what I remind myself when the hard times seem overwhelming. The ride can be terrifying and exhilarating, full of joy and fear. In 2023, the staff and families served by HATW rode many roller coasters together, from the reduction of staff and programs such as our longstanding pregnancy counseling program, budget shortfalls, parents and children experiencing crisis, continued impacts of COVID on operations as well as overall mental and physical health of staff and clients; to the news of a federal subaward for a Kinship Navigator program in collaboration with Michigan State's Kinship Care Resource Center, the execution of our long-awaited evidence-based TBRI (Trust Based Relational Intervention) parenting trainings, the reunification of 25 children with their families, the finalization of 33 adoptions, the growth of our behavioral health program to serve HATW families past and present.

HATW staff are able to stay on the roller coaster because of the incredible network of support that surrounds us, from a Board which believes deeply in the work we do, community partners who provide necessary services, donors and grantors who choose HATW amongst so many other worthy causes, friends and family who make sacrifices of time with us, DHHS and other private child welfare agencies who pull together as partners to serve families - but most importantly, we stay on the roller coaster because we are inspired by the resilience of the amazing children and caretakers we serve who face challenges, and keep moving forward every day. Thank you to all who have played a role in 2023's exhilarating and challenging work providing inclusive, strengths-based services to children and families. It's an honor to be on the ride with you.

### **Foster Care**

Hands Across The Water touches more people through our foster care programs than any others. In 2023 the case management, licensing and visitation teams were very busy bringing in new non-relative foster parents, and working to achieve reunification for children with their parents.

A grant from the Speckhard-Knight Foundation allowed us to continue the work of recruitment and retention of foster parents we feel is so vital to the successful support for young people and families.



### Adoption

One of the biggest changes in our adoption programs during 2023 was the decision to stop offering placement services and pregnancy options counseling as part of the Infant Adoption program, while remaining committed to assisting families looking to adopt infants by continuing to offer home study and post-placement supervision. Of note, in addition to our adoption finalizations, these teams also served:

- 73 International Adoption families, 53 of which used HATW as their primary provider
- 4 Pregnancy Options Clients

### Behavioral Health

The Behavioral Health team was busy seeing clients in 2023, as well as beginning work funded by the Carls Foundation and Ethel and James Flinn Foundation to become certified in Trust-Based Relational Intervention. That work was scheduled to continue through 2024 with planned training for HATW staff, clients and community members.


A new ongoing support group launched for parents of older adoptive children and the new challenges presented by parenting through the teen and young adult years.

And the Ann Arbor Youth Community Foundation Youth Council supported our behavioral health team through a grant to address the need for supplementing payments through Medicaid, which is the primary way through which young people in foster care are able to receive mental health services. Included in this grant was funding to restart our limited-series support group for teens.

### **Events and Activities**

Many exciting events and activities took place at HATW over the course of 2023! Many funders and partners helped provide support for clients, allowed HATW to strengthen its work advocating for LGBTQ+ youth and families, our Board of Directors gained a new member, we showed off our refreshed office space, and wrapped up a three-year friendly rivalry with Ohio.

In March, funding from the Ann Arbor Kiwanis Club Foundation allowed us to offer inperson and virtual art therapy sessions with Kelly Darke, MA.





In March we also launched a new consortium of child welfare agencies committed to improving services to LGBTQ+ youth and families. Twenty-seven individuals representing 19 agencies attended the first session, and the consortium has continued to grow. HATW co-leads this effort with Fostering Futures, through support from the Hope Fund of the Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan.
